November 16, 2005 Meeting Highlights:

The meeting had two major themes. First, members presented the tree ornaments and holiday decorations they made for our Delaware Hospice Festival tree. The ornaments ran the gamut from simplicity to intricacy. Craftsmanship and creativity were impressive, with handsome carvings (one was even gilded), difficult turnings, delicate scrollwork and a wide variety of original forms and attractive finishes. Members explained and demonstrated the techniques and materials they used, including ingenious ways to make small and delicate items in quantity.

Many thanks to Mike Reese for coordinating this project, both within the Guild and with the Delaware Hospice. Thanks also to all the members who made ornaments: Tony Albano, Cas Anolick, Harry Coulsting, Rich Dell, John Dunbar, Roger Earley, Hans Francke, Jim Given, Gary Hayes, Frank Hetzell, Judy Hodgson, Jim Kirkbride, Richard Libera, Mike Reese, Tim Sabo, Jerry Sheeran, Joe Tomeo, Harry Welcher, and Paul Welsh.

Second, noted chairbuilder Jim Stephens presented Part I of his demonstration on building a chair. Starting with a blank of Eastern white pine Jim carved before our eyes the classic seat of a Windsor chair using traditional hand tools: spokeshave, drawknife, gutter axe, scorp, compass plane and chisel. While doing this he explained how to lay out and shape the seat, with specific techniques for working to the layout. Jim also described how he uses two coats each of barn red and black milk paint to give Windsor chairs an appearance of age and wear. He explained his steamer and how he uses it to curve the back of chairs, and shared many other tips. Special thanks to Jim for an interesting and instructive presentation; we look forward to Part II.

This was a good meeting for show and tell; many thanks to all who participated. John Dunbar presented a 9" walnut, brass and steel fixed throat smoothing plane that he made. Inspired by the Norris 14" plane, John's plane is designed for very fine smoothing of figured woods. Jerry Sheeran presented several hand mirrors he has made in various woods. Jerry favors walnut finished in watercolor varnish, but also presented examples made of white oak (in a wipe-on polyurethane) and sycamore (with six coats of spray lacquer). Jerry buys beveled glass mirrors from Kauffman Glass, and attaches them to the backs

with silicone caulk. He showed us MDF templates he uses to lay out the wooden handles and backs.

Bob Cooke presented a handsome red oak sample case, with inlaid strips of Brazilian cherry and box joint corners. Bob also presented wooden louvers he makes for use where HVAC registers are mounted in hardwood floors. Your Editor presented the Mother of all Organizers (a set of fixed shelves divided into 92 pigeonholes) and demonstrated the bridge jig used to position and cut the 176 divider dadoes efficiently on the radial arm saw. And David Webber presented an elegant, precisely fitted box he made for a prized set of chisels, using contrasting woods and a tung oil finish.

Charlie Given won this month's regular raffle prize, a four piece Starrett combination square set. We also raffled tickets to the Hospice Festival of Trees; Gary Hayes won those.

December 21, 2005 Meeting Agenda:

We will have Part II of Jim Stephens' presentation on building a Windsor chair by hand. Jim's exceptional craftsmanship is widely known and recognized – for instance, his work has been displayed at Winterthur, and he has given demonstrations there.

2005–06 Meeting Schedule:
